# Mysterious Gobekli Tepe:

## Testament to Advanced, Ancient Civilisations

Located at the top of a ridge in the region of South Eastern Anatolia in Turkey, Gobekli Tepe is the remains of an ancient civilisation that was excavated by a German archaeological team directed by Klaus Schmidt from 1996 until his death in 2014. The site was initially examined and dismissed by an anthropological team from the Universities of Istanbul and Chicago in the 1960s. With the Schmidt excavations, however, Gobekli Tepe gained international prominence within the archaeological and anthropological fields. http://listverse.wpengine.netdna-cdn.com/wp-content/

ut why all the fuss? Gobekli Tepe is far older than human civilisations were previously thought to have begun. It stands as testament that the origins of human society may be much earlier than previously believed. As reports from the excavations started flowing in, questions on the developmental progress of humankind kept arising.


#### THE MOUND

The Mound is a structure that stands 15 m tall with a diameter of 300 m and approximately 760 lies m above sea level. Geophysical surveys indicated that there THE PILLARS were more than 200 T-shaped pillars dating back from 10,000 to 18,000 BCE within the mound. These 200 pillars were constructed in about 20 circles, with each of the pillars weighing about 20 tonnes and standing 6 m high. A second phase of construction, which was smaller than the earlier ones and stood in rectangular rooms with polished floors, is believed to have been done during the pre-pottery Neolithic B era. How could an ancient people without tools and technology build such

an imposing structure? It is fascinating how Neolithic man acquired and organised the required labour to put up such magnificent structures.

After many years of excavation, Schmidt came to look at sloping rocky the ground around these structures as a "stonecutter's dream". He argued that since limestone rocks used in the construction were relatively soft compared to other rocks, prehistoric masons could have shaped them using flint tools, since metal chisels and hammers were thought not to have been invented yet.

This limestone would shaped at its source and carried some hundreds of yards to the



summit, then lifted upright. THE MEANING After finishing a circle of stone rings, the builders would cover them with dirt and eventually build another ring close by or on top of the previous one. After repeating this process for centuries, they would have ended up with a manmade hilltop.

#### THE ATTRACTION

Schmidt's initial interpretation of the purpose of Gobekli Tepe was that it served as a religious centre for an ancient civilisation, which attracted worshippers on a pilgrimage of over 100 miles. Bones of various animals such as gazelles, pigs and geese litter the site, and are believed to be the remains of food eaten by the congregants. There also many magnificent animal-shaped reliefs carved into the rock structures, the significance of which is not clear.

This great site has attracted thousands of tourists over the vears, and its architectural has fascinated the design world. Although not much can be said for certainty about the discovery, its importance in the history of ancient people and the development of world civilisation is incredible.

anthropological an point of view, the discovery of Gobekli Tepe is very significant as it challenges the previous notions that human civilisations date back only as far as several millennia. Gobekli Tepe has stood for at least 12,000 years, maybe more. For all that, the mystery only deepens, as it is not understood how the ancient people managed to build such a large and complex structure. Could ancient people have had more skill, knowledge and ability than we normally give them credit for?

#### RISE OF THE MACHINES

There is doubt no that electronic music holds the future of mainstream music. In recent decades, with the overwhelmina popularity of computer devices and software technology, there has been an increase in the creation and use of music software. The ramifications of this is that music production is now commonly done by means that are very different from the traditional method of analogue instrumentation and recording. Electronic music is here to stay, while conventional music production is continually subsumed by electronica.

Practically all commercial music production is now done in computer based virtual environments. With studio the huge advancements in microprocessor technology, it is now possible even to create high quality music using only a single laptop computer.

#### THE PEOPLE ARE LISTENING


Listener trends show that electronic music has taken over the pop music market. Just recently, electronic dance music titles from the likes of Calvin Harris, Avicii, Martin Garrix and others, gathered an incredible 11.2 billion online streaming plays in a single year. Aside from this incredible online electronic music activity, the Electric Daisy Carnival, SOUNDS GOOD which takes place in Las Vegas, attracts hundreds of thousands of fans at every event.

In 2014, fans of electronic music purchased about 50 million electronic music tracks. So far in 2015, fans of electronic music have purchased 24.7 million tracks. While outright sales numbers of music have been on the decline, the more staggering fact about the popularity of electronic music is that for every purchase of an electronic music album. there are estimated to be an average 1,500 online streams of the album. This accounts for an average of USD672 million made from online streaming of electronic music albums on a yearly basis.

The trend toward more and more electronic music is clear. One recent confirmation of this is the fact that Avicii's "Wake Me Up", an electronic track, became the most streamed song on Spotify in the year 2014 and has streamed more than 652 million times on YouTube alone to date.

The truth is that electronic music makers have the benefit of utilising more sounds than traditional music makers. These electronically generated sounds are more flexible than the sounds produced bv conventional musical instruments.

The average listener may not realise, for example, that even in traditional acoustic arrangements, electronics are ever present. For instance, a string quartet may be used with electronic layering to make it sound like a 40 piece orchestra. The overall impact of all these trends is that electronic music will produce better music than conventional musical instrumentation and production. Yet, for all this, the ultimate test is: How does it sound to your ear?



he Crooked Forest of Western Poland should be a candidate for the list of wonders of the world. This forest contains 400 trees that bend at 90 degrees at the base, giving them the look of the letter J as they grow toward the sky. There are estimations that the trees could have been between 7 and 10 years old when they experienced the force that transformed them. What makes this grove even more mysterious is that the crooked forest is part of a larger forest with straight pines. Adding to the mystery is the fact that there is no solid explanation as to why they are bent this way. That hasn't stopped people from coming up with theories, of course, so here are 4 of them:

#### TRAVEL & DISCOVERY

#### WAR

It is important to note that the trees at the crooked forest of Western Poland were planted in the 1930s. One theory suggests that during World War II, enemy tanks must have ploughed through the forest, flattening the trees. The trees grew back crooked. Sceptics wonder, however, whether the trees would survive if tanks ploughed over them.

#### GRAVITY

Some people blame gravity for the enigma. They claim that the area could have experienced fluctuations in the force of gravity, like maybe there was a unique pull of gravity around the area. There is no known theory or scientific observation of gravity pulling sideways, so this theory is one of pure conjecture.

#### SNOW

Another view suggests that heavy snow could have flattened the trees for a long period of time. When combined with a long spring melt, the trees' curvature could have been altered. This is especially possible if the trunks had a layer of snow pressing on them as the trees grew during spring. But why would the snow affect only 400 trees in the forest?

#### **HUMANS**

Well, the curves could be manmade. The trees are quite consistently shaped, which could be evidence of some human intervention. The view suggests that in the 1930s, farmers manipulated the trees to suit specific construction purposes, for instance, building ships. There is an article available on the internet that supports this view: "Wooden Vessel Ship Construction". It points to the fact that trees were bent in order to grow a needed set of curved timbers. These could have been meant to strengthen the ship internally. This view, while the most boring, seems the most plausible.

World War II would have probably disrupted the completion of the local project. The town was not occupied for about 4 decades after the War. Even the people who live there do not have the slightest idea why the trees bend like they do.

The Crooked Forest of Western Poland will always remain a mystery. What is certain is that they make a one-of-a-kind sight to behold, and will provide you memories for a lifetime. Time to book a trip to Poland, perhaps?



# OBSCURE ORIGINS: BOWLING

#### SINCE PEOPLE BEGAN KNOCKING THINGS DOWN

enpin bowling is a popular modern sport that is played by many people all over the world. In the US, for example, it's part of the casual sporting culture, while in Malaysia, it provides a convenient and fun way for friends and family to spend a bit of time together.



#### **ANCIENT ORIGINS**

Where did bowling come from, however? According to the International Bowling Museum, bowling might have been invented in 3200 BC in Egypt. The truth is, it might have started much earlier than that, seeing that man has always been fascinated with knocking things down. The aim of bowling is simply to knock something down with a ball. According to some archaeologists, bowling could have started during the Stone Age.

#### NAUGHTY HISTORY

There are various forms of bowling, with tenpin bowling being the most popular form of the sport played virtually everywhere today. Nine-pin bowling was an underground game loved by gamblers in the US until 1841, when a law was passed in Connecticut to ban it. In order to circumvent that law, an extra pin was added, creating tenpin bowling. These days, nine-pin bowling is still banned except in the state of Texas.

### TENPIN BOWLING: HOW IT IS PLAYED

Most people are somewhat familiar with the rules of bowling, but here's a refresher course. A game of tenpin bowling involves ten 15-inchtall pins that are 4.7 inches wide. These pins are set up in a triangle at the base of a synthetic wooden alley. The foul line lies 60 feet from the headpin. Players must not step across this line.

The game is played in ten frames: players get two chances in each frame to knock all the pins down. A player gets a point for each pin he manages to knock down, but gets 10 points for knocking all the pins in one strike. There is another variation known as "no tap bowling", which differs from the tenpin rule by requiring a player to knock nine pins down on their first roll.

#### MODERN BOWLING: A PROFESSIONAL SPORT

From the caveman or ancient Egyptian days of "knocking things down with a ball", tenpin bowling has grown into a respected, prestigious professional sport. There are now people who play in professional bowling leagues. For these people, bowling has become career, with the Professional Bowlers Association boasting membership in 13 countries. Professional bowlers who are at their peak can earn close to half a million dollars in a tournament.

Interestingly enough, Japan is the home of the world's biggest bowling alley – and hopefully by the time the Olympics go to Japan in 2020, bowling will have made the cut as an Olympic event.

But one does not have to go that far, does one? Although a sophisticated sport today, the basics of bowling remain to "knock things down with a ball". Add to that the participation of good friends and family, and you have the recipe for a time of enjoyment, laughs and sportsmanship. Head on down to the club and bowl a few games!

# Delectable Origins: Asam Laksa

hey say that Malaysia is a melting pot of cultures, and few places show more proof of that than Penang. The island state's signature dish asam laksa is a shining example of this. A wonderful mixture of flavours and textures that hits every taste group – sweet, sour, salty and umami – this dish has its origins buried in layers of cultural history and innovation. Here we hope to shed some light on an origin story as complex as the spicy, sweet-and-sour noodle dish itself.



#### WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Laksa is perhaps the most quintessential fusion Chinese and Malay cuisine it's thought in some quarters to be a creation of 15th century Chinese immigrants to Malaysia. However, even the origins of the word "laksa" debatable: some claim it proves Indian influences thanks to its similarity to the Hindi word "lakhshah". Others note that laksa sounds like a Chinese phrase that translates as "spicy sand" - which is fitting, considering the gritty texture of laksa. Many people go with the idea that laksa comes from the Persian word "laksha". Interestingly enough, Vietnamese mint, which is an important additive to the dish. is also called the laksa leaf. So you can see how the origins of the dish are more than a bit obscured by history.

#### FOOD & BEVERAGE

#### **BORN BY THE SEA**


Historically, Malaysia has been heavily influenced both culturally and politically by India. This is why some people point to asam pedas ikan which is a sour fish-based soup lacking noodles and enjoyed by Indian sailors and Malaysian pirates of old. This dish is also enjoyed by Malaysian fishermen, which is where the most popular theory of origin comes from. The idea is that because variants of laksa can be found in both the North and off the East Coast of Malaysia that its origins lie in the coastal communities. Needina make the most of every catch, families would have used the smaller, bonier fish left in a net for an "everything soup", which would have included tamarind to mask the oilier taste, and whatever spices could be found. The growth of the Peranakan Baba-Nvonva culture would have led to the inclusion of Chinese ingredients along with Siamese herbal leaves and Indonesian spices.

THE PERANAKAN CONNECTION

Peranakan or Nyonya food is a fusion of Chinese and Malay ingredients with a lesser focus on a merger of Chinese and Indonesian and Siamese influences. The truth of the matter is the origin of this dish lacks a simple conclusion – it is instead a layered cross-cultural

mix including ties to the various immigrants to Malaya. The main elements of that mix are native Malay and the Chinese, but there are notes from various layers of history included.

In the end, though, the varied origins of asam laksa make it as Malaysian as Malaysia itself. Here is hoping you enjoyed this very brief look at asam laksa's cultural history and that you continue to investigate it – preferably while enjoying a bowl or two.







